PLANS FOR NEW MILL.

Great Addition to Michigan Paper Company's Plant.

A meeting of the directors of the Michigan Paper company was held yesterday morning, February 4. Every member was present, except C. O. Gilkey, who is spending the winter in California. Plans for the new mills drawn by Dan J. Albertson were acted on and accepted, plans which developed will result in covering the paper mill ground with buildings.

Commencing at the southwest corner of the grounds on Mill street, they will erect a machine room, 208 feet long by 80 wide. In the front end of this will be located the office, 20x60. This room will have one new straight Fourdrinier machine, 112 inch.

The machine, now in use, 70 inch width, will also be installed in this room. This building will be one story high and will have a fourteen foot basement under it. North of this a building will be erected, 60 feet wide on Mill street and 138 feet in length. This will contain the beaters and Jordans, join onto the old beater room and will contain ten beaters. Running south from the present beater room will be a building, crossing the race about where the present office stands, connecting with the stock room, 64x160 feet over all. This building will be four stories high and will receive all stock brought into the mill. A spur track from the G. R. & I. will run the whole length of the building. On the east side of the north end of machine room, in the angle formed by the machine and beater rooms, will be the engine room, 47 feet by 64, containing three engines, one for each paper machine and one for general power.

South of the engine room there will be the boiler room, 32x48 with three 250 horse power boilers. A spur track also leads to this building. East of the machine room and office at the south end is the finishing room, 60x72. The main track of the spur runs in front of this office and the finishing room. The beater rooms will have concrete floors as will part of the machine room.

These buildings when finished will be a fine addition to our village and Supt. Wm. Thomas will wear a broad smile when he sees in the completion of this plant the realization of his hopes for many years.
